4. Being Together

The Rev'd Gillian Moses to move; tba seconding:

That this Synod:

- 1. Acknowledges the document "Being Together Expectations of Behaviour in our Church Community" is a policy of this Diocese for all church communities.
- 2. Adopts the policy as the standard of behaviour expected in Synod discussions and debates.
- 3. Exhorts all members to respect one another's differences, seeking at all times to listen respectfully and to understand beliefs and opinions that differ from our own.

5. Domestic & Family Violence

The Rev'd Gillian Moses to move; The Rev'd Jan Crombie seconding:

That this Synod:

- 1. Recognises the social, emotional and spiritual cost of domestic and family violence among people connected with the Anglican Church;
- Commends the General Synod Family Violence Working Group/NCLS Family Safety Study and requests that parishes and agencies circulate associated survey links around their networks to ensure broad participation by people connected with the Anglican Church;
- 3. Affirms this Diocese's commitment to gender equality, understanding that this is the most significant driver of domestic and family violence;
- 4. Requests the establishment of a Diocesan Family Violence Working Group to oversee the work of policy development, training and education on prevention, intervention and

response. Membership of this group should include clergy and laity, as well as experts from outside the church.

Rationale

In 2017, the General Synod Family Violence Working Group (FVWG) was established to:

- a) investigate a professionally designed, independent research study into the nature and prevalence of family violence within the Australian Anglican Church population,
- b) establish the nature and extent of current Family Violence policies, pastoral care frameworks and training modules across Dioceses,
- c) develop a "best practice" model policy and pastoral care framework for responding well to situations involving family violence within our parishes and organisations
- d) recommend curriculum content and/or guidelines to address unhealthy views about power or the marginalisation of women and other survivors of family violence.

In March 2019, representatives from Australian Dioceses gathered in Sydney to consult with the FVWG. From this conference, a number of recommendations emerged that were designed to encourage a nationally consistent approach to prevention, intervention and response. Among the recommendations were the establishment of Diocesan Working Groups to carry this work forward at Diocesan levels, in developing and implementing policy and training.

The FVWG has also commissioned a national study into Family Safety in partnership with National Church Life Survey. It is hoped that as many people as possible who are connected with the Anglican Church of Australia will participate in scoping surveys to ensure that a representative sample of responses can be collected. This study will cover:

- 1. The nature of experiences of family violence in connection with Anglican Churches,
- 2. The attitudes, beliefs and knowledge of clergy and church workers in relation to family violence.
- 3. The prevalence of experiences of family violence among people who identify as Anglican,

6. Affirming Anglican Unity in Diversity

The Rev'd Dr Josephine Inkpin to move; tba seconding:

That this Synod:

1. Affirms with thanksgiving the Anglican Tradition, its historic formularies, Anglican Method in theology, and the rich and dynamic diversity of expression in Anglican prayer, theology, and ethical living.

- Notes with profound concern the serious strains within the Anglican Communion and condemns the schismatic forces which are ostracising us, undermining the legitimate autonomy of Anglican provinces, and weakening the authority of the Archbishop and other Instruments of Unity.
- 3. Recommits this Diocese to living in communion with all provinces of the Anglican Communion, respecting their boundaries and cultural contexts; and encourages closer relationships, especially with provinces in the Global South in their struggles for peace, justice and ecological sustainability.
- 4. Calls on all Anglicans worldwide to recommit themselves to dialogue, including 'indaba' and other collaborative processes, in order to contribute faithfully and constructively to the 'continually contested conversation' which is historic Anglicanism.
- 5. Encourages all Diocesan members to engage more deeply with the variety of Anglican identities, and commends the Being Anglican short course, the Praying in Anglican Ways 360 course, Anglican Foundations, and other resources available through St Francis College.
- 6. Requests Diocesan Council to work with the MEC and PMC in exploration of further means to enable a deeper understanding and commitment to Anglican pluralism within the Diocese.
- 7. Requests the Archbishop and regional bishops to develop means by which all members of the Diocese can be involved in prayer for, learning about, and contributing to, the work of the Lambeth Conference in 2020.
- 8. Requests the Archbishop to communicate this resolution to the Archbishop of Canterbury, and to the Primate and all bishops in the Anglican Church of Australia.

7. Affirming Anglican Schools Support of Gender Diverse Students

Dr Gemma Dashwood to move; The Rev'd Sue Wilton seconding:

That this Synod:

- 1. Affirms that Anglican Schools are to be places where all people, including those who are transgender and gender diverse, are welcomed, loved and supported.
- 2. Commends Anglican Schools on the work they are doing in:
 - a) Supporting transgender students who have transitioned or are transitioning.
 - b) Developing gender neutral uniform options and other practical support measures.
 - c) Supporting families of transgender students.

- d) Educating staff on the needs and gifts of transgender students.
- 3. Encourages Anglican Schools to recognise the "Australian Standards of Care and Treatment Guidelines for trans and gender diverse children and adolescents" as best practice in enabling transgender people to flourish.

8. Integration of Schools

The Rev'd Chris Tyack to move; The Rev'd Don Parker seconding:

That the Archbishop convene a working group (including school principals, chaplains, and parish clergy) to consider how schools and churches can collaborate to promote more integrated models of ministry in suitable locations.

9. Nicene Creed

The Rev'd Dr Cathy Laufer to move; The Rev'd Canon Richard Tutin seconding:

That this Synod set up a committee comprising the Rev'd Dr Cathy Laufer, Canon Dr Jim McPherson and Canon Richard Tutin, with power to co-opt, to investigate the possible cessation of saying the filioque clause in the Nicene Creed in worship in the Diocese, to liaise with the General Synod Ecumenical Relations Committee on this matter, and to report back to Synod 2020.

Rationale

When the Nicene Creed was agreed at the Council of Constantinople in 381, the clause about the Holy Spirit read (in Greek):

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father, who with the Father and Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

Latin speaking western congregations slowly began adding the words "and the Son" (Latin: filioque) after "proceeds from the Father". The addition slowly became commonplace even though it was never formally agreed to at a Church Council. The Greek speaking east was horrified. The addition of filioque was a major contributor to the schism between east and west in 1054.

Recent discussions have recommended the removal of the filioque clause from the western creed, including Anglican-Orthodox dialogues and Lambeth Conferences.

This motion asks for a committee comprising three theologians familiar with the issues to examine the matter and report back to Synod.

10. Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse

Mr Julian Glassock to move; Ms Pamela Rae seconding:

That this Synod:

- humbly thanks survivors of sexual abuse in institutions of this Diocese who made submissions to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to child Sexual Abuse for their courage and perseverance in telling the truth of their experiences;
- 2. acknowledges the toll these contributions have taken on survivors, their families and loved ones;
- 3. reiterates its sincere apology to those harmed by sexual abuse in our institutions;
- 4. expresses the hope that eventually survivors may come to trust our sincerity and that we can be reconciled with them;
- 5. commits itself to carefully discern the ongoing lessons that the Final Report of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse offers, so that we can respond helpfully and lovingly to all those harmed by sexual abuse and strive to be a beacon of hope and strength to those who carry this unfair and undeserved burden;
- 6. records its thanks to the Archbishop for his diligent efforts with regard to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse;
- 7. expresses its gratitude for his leadership of our Diocese in responding to the Royal Commission and in putting protocols and procedures in place which help to safeguard children now and in the future.

Rationale

In 2017, at the first session of this 79th synod, I objected to a very similar motion moved by the Rev'd Mark Calder. I felt that no matter how well intentioned Rev'd Calder's motion was, at that time it was untimely. At that time, the Royal Commission was still conducting it business and hadn't made its final report. At that session it was decided that the motion not be put. The Royal Commission handed down its report on 15th December of 2017. The Prime Minister, on the 22nd October 2018, offered an apology on behalf of our nation, to all those who had survived sexual abuse. In my opinion it is now timely to consider a motion of thanks with regards to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Sexual Abuse.

11. Australian Board of Missions

The Rev'd Jasmine Dow to move; Ms Sarah Gover seconding:

That this Synod:

- 1. Gives thanks to God for the ministry of the The Rev'd Ken Spreadborough over 12 years, as a member of the Diocesan ABM Committee, and for his leadership for the past eight years.
- Gives thanks to God for the ministry of The Rev'd Canon Arthur Fellows over three decades. For his coordination of the collection of stamps contributed by faithful church members and the sale of these stamps to raise tens of thousands of dollars for the ministry of ABM.
- 3. Commends the people of the Diocese for their support of ABM through the 2018 Archbishop's November Appeal which raised over \$25,000 to help support ministry at Yarrabah including Faithfulness in Service training and training in how to lead liturgy and use resources such as e-pray.
- 4. Commends the people of the Diocese for their support of ABM, generally, with over \$180,000 being raised for ABM in 2018, amounting to 15% of the total donations from all of the Australian Dioceses.
- 5. Encourages the people of the Diocese to support the 2019 Archbishop's November Appeal in aid of the ministry of Newton College Theological College in Papua New Guinea.

12. Professional Standards Canon Amendment Canon

The Very Rev'd Peter Catt to move; tba seconding:

This Synod requests that the Legal Committee brings to the next session of Synod a Canon to amend the Professional Standards Canon in such a way that will ensure that amendments to Faithfulness in Service are adopted by this Synod.

Rationale

At present when amendments to Faithfulness in Service are adopted by the Standing Committee of General Synod they automatically take effect in this Diocese. This means that Synod does not reflect on Faithfulness in Service. This reduces the impact of the code. Requiring our Synod to adopt changes will mean that Synod will be focusing on the document. This will increase awareness and therefore, the effectiveness, of the document.

13. Conversion Therapy

The Right Rev d Jeremy Greaves to move; The Rev d Dr Ann Solari seconding:

That this Synod:

- 1. Acknowledges that every person is made in the image of God.
- 2. Acknowledges the pain and damage conversion therapy and sexual orientation change efforts have caused in people's lives.
- 3. Will not advocate the practice of conversion therapy or propagate conversion/reparative ideology, which includes the message that LGBT people are broken or that their sexuality or gender expression is a form of brokenness or sickness physical, mental or spiritual.
- 4. Calls on the Australian government to protect youth and families by banning conversion therapy and asking for stricter regulations for counsellors in this area.

Rationale

14. Thank you to Jim Eyles

Mrs Diane Massurit to move; The Right Rev d Cameron Venables seconding:

That this Synod recognises the extraordinary contribution of Jim Eyles in support of ministry in Western parishes, serving as auditor over the past 18 years for 16 parishes.

That the President be requested to write to Jim conveying our appreciation.

Rationale

In 2001, when Jim was in his mid 60s, he responded to a request in *Focus* for an auditor to assist parishes in the Western Region.

Since 2001, up to and including the 16 audits completed for AGMs this year, Jim has completed more than 200 audits. These have included for the parishes of Booval, Chinchilla, St George, Mitchell, Roma and many others across the region.

Jim stated in an email notifying parishes that he could not seek nomination as auditor at the 2019 AGMs, that this opportunity of "gaining a little insight into life in the Western parishes, particularly the importance of the weather, has been a very rewarding experience and I am going to very much miss the annual and other contact which I have enjoyed."

A gift and card are being prepared for Jim with thanks from those places where he has so generously served.

INSURANCE CANON REPEAL CANON 2019

A Canon to repeal the Insurance Canon.

The Archbishop, Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Brisbane assembled in Synod prescribe –

Short Title

1. This Canon may be cited as the "Insurance Canon Repeal Canon 2019".

Repeal

- 2. The Insurance Canon 1997 is repealed with effect from the date determined under section 3.
- 3. The repeal in section 2 will take effect on a date declared by Diocesan Council.
- 4. Regulation I Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave Compensation Scheme (Regulation I) made by the Archbishop-in-Council under the Insurance Canon is repealed with effect from the date that the repeal of the Insurance Canon takes effect.

Transitional

- 5. (1) Expressions defined in the Insurance Canon or in Regulation I Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave Compensation Scheme have the same meaning when used in this section.
 - (2) Nothing in this Canon affects the validity of any action taken in reliance on the Insurance Canon or Regulation I before their repeal.
 - (3) Any direction, obligation or requirement given, made or created under the Insurance Canon in respect of a Responsible Person may be preserved or continued by regulation made by Archbishop-in-Council under the Diocesan Governance Canon.
 - (4) The Fund may be continued by regulation made by Archbishop-in-Council under the Diocesan Governance Canon.
 - (5) The Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave Compensation Scheme may be continued by regulation made by Archbishop-in-Council under the Diocesan Governance Canon and in such case:
 - (a) the rights, benefits and obligations of Enrolled Members and Remunerating Bodies that have been created under Regulation I will be preserved and continue unaffected in the continued scheme despite the repeal of Regulation I; and
 - (b) the exercise of any powers and any decisions or determinations made by the Board of Management under Regulation I remain in full force and effect and will apply to any continuation of the Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave Compensation Scheme,

unless, in each case, otherwise affected by a regulation made by Archbishop-in-Council under the Diocesan Governance Canon.

INSURANCE CANON REPEAL CANON 2019

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

- 1. This proposed Canon repeals the Insurance Canon and provides for the transition of various matters that need to be preserved to regulations to be made under the Diocesan Governance Canon.
- 2. The key purpose of the repeal is to disband the Board of Management created by the Insurance Canon and remove duplication of responsibility for insurance services. Under the Diocesan Governance Canon, responsibility for insurance services lies with the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission (FDSC).
- 3. The Insurance Canon:
 - a. Creates the Insurance Fund into which contributions to premiums and other costs are paid by parishes and agencies in the Diocese;
 - b. Creates the Board of Management (appointed by Archbishop-in-Council) which
 has a duty to ensure that property is adequately insured and that the
 Corporation has all other necessary insurance and to distribute the surplus of
 the Fund in accordance with purposes approved by FDSC;
 - c. Establishes by regulation the Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave compensation scheme;
 - d. Requires parishes and agencies to make contributions to the Insurance Fund and the Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave compensation scheme;
 - e. Requires various information and notifications of incidents to be made by parishes and agencies.
- 4. Under the Diocesan Governance Canon, as amended by regulation in 2017 and by canon of Synod in 2018, the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission (FDSC) has responsibility for strategic direction, leadership and oversight in administrative support areas including, amongst other areas, insurance services.
- 5. The Board of Management, as a separate canonically created body, duplicates the role of the FDSC. In practice, the Board currently reports to the FDSC and closely consults with the FDSC and provides it with advice about matters such as its membership and the re-tendering of insurance services for the Diocese in 2018.
- 6. This role could just as easily be managed through FDSC and, if required, a specialist insurance working group at renewal time. Reporting of insurance issues is currently incorporated into quarterly risk reporting and this ensures all of the FDSC Commissioners are aware of claims and emerging issues.
- 7. As the role of the Board of Management is effectively redundant, then the question of the purpose of the Insurance Canon arises. Save for the creation of the Board of Management, all of the other purposes of the Canon could be achieved under regulations made under the Diocesan Governance Canon.
- 8. One advantage of this is that those regulations could be reviewed and amended by Diocesan Council when administrative or structural improvements are made to

insurance services from time to time. Synod would still have the final say on such changes as it has a disallowance power. Under section 75 of the Diocesan Governance Canon, all regulations under the Canon must be laid before Synod and may by motion be amended or repealed.

- 9. The regulations would largely replicate what is in the current Insurance Canon (except for the Board of Management) and Regulation I under that Canon which establishes the Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave compensation scheme.
- 10. The structure of the draft Canon is as follows:
 - a. Section 2 repeals the Insurance Canon.
 - b. Section 3 the draft repeal canon is expressed to come into effect on a date declared by Diocesan Council. Diocesan Council could declare this date as the same date it creates the regulations at its first meeting after Synod.
 - c. Section 4 repeals Regulation I Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave Compensation Scheme at the same time as the Insurance Canon is repealed.
 - d. Section 5 contains transitional provisions to ensure that the various powers, obligations and rights created under the Insurance Canon and the Sickness and Accident and Maternity Leave Compensation Scheme continue under the new regulations.

b) Participation by Persons of Concern in Parishes Canon

Anglican Church of Australia - Diocese of Brisbane

PARTICIPATION BY PERSONS OF CONCERN IN PARISHES CANON

A Canon to facilitate the implementation of the standards for safe ministry with a Person of Concern prescribed under the Safe Ministry to Children Canon 2017 of General Synod.

Short Title

1. This Canon may be cited as the "Participation by Persons of Concern in Parishes Canon".

Interpretation

- 2. In this Canon unless the context otherwise requires:
 - (1) "Safe Ministry Canon" means the Safe Ministry to Children Canon 2017 of General Synod and any amendments to that Canon adopted by this Diocese from time to time;
 - (2) "Persons of Concern Policy" means the policy from time to time identified in the Second Schedule to the Safe Ministry Canon;
 - (3) "Churchwarden" has the meaning as in the Parishes Regulation Canon.
 - (4) Words and expressions defined in the Persons of Concern Policy and used in this Canon have the same meaning given to them in the Persons of Concern Policy.
 - (5) "Direction" means a direction made under the Persons of Concern Policy by the Archbishop (or other person authorised by the Persons of Concern Policy in consultation with the Archbishop) that a Person of Concern not participate in the life of the parish.

Authority to Exclude Persons of Concern from Church Property

- 3. In any application of the Persons of Concern Policy which results in a Direction:
 - (1) The Archbishop or, at the Archbishop's election, either the Minister or Churchwardens of the Parish may issue a written notice to the Person of Concern containing the Direction.
 - (2) A Direction will be taken as given to a Person of Concern when the written notice is:

- a. delivered in person;
- b. left at the person's last known residential address;
- c. sent by pre-paid post to the person's last known postal address;
- d. emailed to the person's last known email address; or
- e. sent by text message to the person's last known mobile phone number.
- 4. Where a Direction is given to a Person of Concern, the Direction:
 - (1) has the effect of prohibiting the Person of Concern from entering any property of that parish;
 - (2) will remain in force indefinitely unless and until it is revoked.
- 5. If a Person of Concern enters any property of the parish whilst a Direction remains in force, the Person of Concern will be deemed to be a trespasser.

Archbishop's Authority to Exclude Persons of Concern

6. Despite the terms of the Persons of Concern Policy, if at any time the Archbishop decides that a Direction should be given in the interests of protecting people in a Parish from the risk of harm from sexual abuse by a Person of Concern, the Archbishop may give a Direction without complying with the Process of Assessment or any other requirement under the Persons of Concern Policy.

PARTICIPATION BY PERSONS OF CONCERN IN PARISHES CANON 2019 EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

- 1. This proposed Canon intends to facilitate the implementation of:
 - the Safe Ministry to Children Canon 2017 (Safe Ministry Canon); and
 - the Policy for Safe Ministry in a parish where there is a risk of sexual abuse by a Person of Concern (Person of Concern Policy), which is a schedule to the Safe Ministry Canon,

that were passed by the General Synod in 2017 and adopted by the Brisbane Synod later the same year.

- 2. The purpose of the Safe Ministry Canon and Persons of Concern Policy includes, amongst other things, to help ensure that, where a Person of Concern is currently participating or wishes to participate in the life of a parish, people in the parish are not placed at increased risk of being sexually abused.
- 3. The Persons of Concern Policy sets out a process to ensure that a person of concern is subject to an agreed safety regime that is supervised by an accountability group within the parish. In cases where this is not possible or able to be agreed, the policy contemplates that the person should be excluded from participation in the parish.
- 4. Consequently, the General Synod and the Brisbane Synod recognised that, in giving effect to the Safe Ministry Canon and Persons of Concern Policy, it might become necessary, either during or as a consequence of the process of assessing and managing Persons of Concern, to direct those individuals not to participate in the life of the parish.
- 5. The provisions of this Canon are proposed to be to the following effect:
 - Section 2 contains definitions, including the adoption of the meanings of terms in the Persons of Concern Policy

Of key relevance is the definition of "Person of Concern" in the Policy:

Person of Concern is a person whose presence constitutes a risk of sexual abuse to people in the parish and may include one or more of the following:

- a person who has pleaded guilty to, has been convicted of, or has admitted to having committed, a sexual criminal offence; or
- a person who is currently charged with a sexual criminal offence; or
- a person who has been disciplined or had other action taken against them under a disciplinary or professional standards process of the Church because of Sexual Misconduct, or who has been refused ordination, employment or appointment in the Church because of an adverse risk assessment arising from Sexual Misconduct; or

- a person against whom allegations of Sexual Misconduct are currently being dealt with under a disciplinary or professional standards process of the Church; or
- a person who has been disciplined by an organisation other than the Anglican Church of Australia for Sexual Misconduct, or
- a person who, as a result of Sexual Misconduct, has received an adverse risk assessment from a professional with appropriate qualifications and experience in accordance with the requirements of another church or a statutory authority; or
- a person who has received or is receiving treatment for disordered sexual behaviour.
- Section 3(1) Authorises the Archbishop or, at the Archbishop's election, either the Minister or Churchwardens of the parish, to issue a notice to a Person of Concern directing them not to participate in the life of the parish.
- Section 3(2) Sets out the various methods by which such a notice, which must be a written notice, can be issued to a Person of Concern
- Section 4 Provides the effect and duration of a written notice once it has been issued in accordance with this proposed Canon. That is a notice, once issued, will:
 - a) have the effect of prohibiting the Person of Concern from entering any property of that parish; and
 - b) remain in effect indefinitely unless/until it is revoked.
- Section 5 deems a Person of Concern entering property of the parish while a Direction is in force to be a trespasser.
- Section 6 Authorises the Archbishop to issue, at any time, a notice to a Person
 of Concern directing them not to participate in the life of the parish if the Archbishop
 considers it is necessary in the interests of protecting people in a Parish from the
 risk of harm from sexual abuse. That is, this provision seeks to clarify, for the
 avoidance of doubt, that the Archbishop's power to issue such a notice is not limited
 by the process (or to specific stages of the process) set out in the Persons of
 Concern Policy for assessing and managing Persons of Concern.



REPORTS & EXTRA DOCUMENTATION

PROTECTION OF THE ENVIRONMENT CANON 2007 REPORT TO BRISBANE SYNOD 2019

At the 2018 Brisbane Diocesan Synod a request was made for a progress report covering the implementation of the requirements of the *Protection of the Environment Canon 2007*. Specifically Synod requested:

- 1. Individual parishioners, every Diocesan organisation, and the Diocese as a whole, to commit to putting in the necessary time and energy to take seriously our care for the environment, including the commitments agreed to in the above-mentioned Canon,
- Diocesan Council, in consultation with the Social Responsibilities Committee and Angligreen, to develop a process whereby we are able to examine our successes, our failures, and ways in which we can better respond to the undertakings we made in 2009, and
- 3. Requests that progress on this task be the subject of a 2019 Report to this Synod. This report would mark the tenth anniversary of the commitment made in 2009.

BACKGROUND

The General Synod's *Protection of the Environment Canon 2007*, was adopted at the 2009 Brisbane Diocesan Synod.

The Protection of the Environment Canon 2007 requires the following actions:

"Every Diocese which adopts this Canon undertakes to reduce its environmental footprint by increasing the water and energy efficiency of its current facilities and operations and by ensuring that environmental sustainability is an essential consideration in the development of any new facilities and operations, with a view to ensuring that the Diocese minimises its contribution to the mean global surface temperature rise."

WORK CURRENTLY UNDERWAY

The following steps have been taken in the Anglican Church in Southern Queensland that go to implementing the obligations in the *Protection of the Environment Canon 2007*:

Diocesan Operations

- The car fleet of the Diocese and Anglicare are being gradually transferred over to hybrid vehicles.
- Angligreen continues to prepare a column every edition in the 'Wednesday Weekly' newsletter distributed to all Parishes and Diocesan staff. These newsletter columns are designed to continue the process of cultural change across the Diocese.
- Angligreen produce a monthly newsletter that is circulated to subscribers.
- Each Parish has been requested to provide the Diocese with details of its carbon footprint and water usage, including information in relation to any actions taken to reduce these measures through the Parish Annual Return. These questions will be asked annually to analyse the movement in Parish environmental impacts.

- 59 Parishes have reported that they either have solar panels or are investigating the installation of solar panels at their churches.
- 35 Parishes have reported the use of water tanks at their Parish.
- The Diocese has an ethical investment policy, which endeavours to ensure environmentally sustainable investments, including not investing in companies whose major business activity is the extraction of fossil fuels.

Schools and Early Education & Child Care Services

Examples of environmental sustainability activities in schools are set out below. All Anglican schools have a focus on environmental sustainability.

- St Paul's Anglican School, Bald Hills, in conjunction with local environmental groups and with funding from Brisbane City Council has implemented the development of a koala corridor at St Paul's School.
- St Andrew's Anglican College, Peregian Springs, have implemented a policy of 'Keep Cups' for all staff and parents, have removed plastic water bottles from the campus, ensured all available food is sold in either cardboard or recyclable packaging, food scraps are composted on site, produce from the St Andrew's garden is used in the school canteen and packaging is recycled where possible.
- Fraser Coast Anglican College has developed a water collection system that is used to maintain gardens and ovals across the campus, implanted power saving initiatives across all facilities, commenced a plastic and can recycling scheme and started a move to using solar power. The school has also built relationships with local environmental groups such as Hervey Bay Micro Bats to develop and sustain habitats for native animals on campus and the students are engaged in environment activities through the Edge program such as maintaining native bee hives, bee hotels, bird boxes and through gardening projects.
- St Hilda's School, Gold Coast, has approximately 90% of campus grounds watering achieved through a combination of onsite water storage and bore water. A new pool filtration and water treatment plant is saving approximately one million litres of water per annum. Implementation of solar panels on existing roof structures produces 286kw of power, equivalent to approximately 23% of the school's power consumption.
- Anglican Church Grammar School has performed the following:
 - Integrated sustainability into teaching, learning and professional development through:
 - o Integrating sustainability themes into the school; and
 - o Developing sustainability into curricula, co-curricular and professional development activities.
 - Reduced its environmental footprint and contributed to improving the environment through:
 - Monitoring and reducing energy use;
 - Investing in energy efficient technology;
 - Minimising waste through recycling and efficient use of resources; and

- Monitoring and reducing water use.
- > Planned and developed sustainable buildings and infrastructure through:
 - Including sustainable requirements in School Built Master Plan;
 - Designing infrastructure that is flexible to accommodate change; and
 - Undertaking sustainable refurbishments and fit-outs of existing buildings.
- ➤ Integrated financial sustainability into developing and implementing responsible sustainable behaviour through:
 - Developing long-term goals and identifying resources required to achieve them;
 - Controlling costs without threatening the teaching environment for students and staff;
 - Prioritising funds to shift away from poor practices and aging infrastructure towards best practice performance.
- Paper and cardboard recycling, soft plastics recycling, a can and bottle collection scheme, a habitat rejuvenation scheme for the Bridgewater Creek, offcuts from the design technology area used to make toys for children in developing countries, the gardens at St Benedict's and St Paul's Churches East Brisbane maintained by students and Norman Creek is cleaned of rubbish at least twice a term by different houses of the school.
- As a function of being an approved provider of childcare services, ACSQ's 19 early learning and child care services are required to have Quality Improvement Plans. In 2019, these plans have a focus around sustainability, broken into four overarching components:
 - > Staff training, which consists of training around sustainability practices;
 - ➤ Eco efficiency audits of water usage, electricity usage, waste and toxic substances being performed at the Sunnybank Early Learning Centre and Rainbow Town Early Learning Centre;
 - Data collection around environmental impacts/factors, including electricity and water usage; and
 - > Online community interactions through regular group reflections across the participating Centres.

Anglicare Southern Queensland

- Anglicare facilities in general have implemented the following to reduce overall environmental impacts:
 - Separation of recycling waste;
 - Sharing of desk bins where possible and appropriate;
 - Use of bio-degradable bin liners;
 - LED lighting being installed in fit-outs;
 - Replacement of existing bulbs with LED bulbs where possible;

- Low emission paint being used in fit-outs to reduce both environmental impacts and client respiratory effects;
- Water and energy efficient washing machines being installed at residential aged care facilities;
- Boilers being fitted with on/off timing systems; and
- Power efficient air conditioning systems being installed across all sites.

FUTURE ACTIVITIES

The following activities are underway or in planning to reduce ACSQ's environmental impacts into the future:

- The Anglican Church Southern Queensland Property Team are preparing guidelines on incorporating Ecologically Sustainable Development (ESD) initiatives into applicable capital projects. These initiatives include:
 - Requiring specifications based on sustainable selections (natural finishes, zero volatile organic compounds emissions, durable but also biodegradable options, sustainably sourced materials which can replaced easily etc);
 - Design briefs which focus on correct orientation, working with the site topography, correct fenestration to maximise breezes and natural daylight while minimising heat gain; and
 - Minimising energy consumption through minimising unnecessary heating/cooling/lighting. The incorporation of renewable energy sources is an important element but must be suited to location with a reasonable payback period.

Another key element of the Property Team's future direction, which is often undervalued but makes a significant difference, is the use of flexible space configurations which accommodates changing functional needs. Since every building component and every step of building assembly/construction generates embodied energy, minimising the need to demolish and construct new facilities is the most sustainable option. This requires building facilities that have flexible space, and/or be engineered to allow future changes without costly amendments as this approach creates a far smaller carbon footprint in the long term.

 Anglicare is introducing at Symes Grove Residential Aged Care Centre (Taigum) a scheme where food waste is to be pulped and turned into fertilizer at a JJ Richard and Sons facility.

The attached Regulation was made by Diocesan Council on 28 February 2019.

The Regulation is made under section 73 of the Diocesan Governance Canon, which allows Diocesan Council from time to time to make, amend or repeal Regulations under the Canon. Under section 75 of the Canon, a copy of the Regulation must be laid before the next ordinary session of Synod after it is made. Any member of Synod may present a motion for the amendment or repeal of the Regulation (see section 75).

The principal purposes of the Regulation are:

- To confirm records of the Church are the property of the Corporation and must be dealt with in accordance with the Regulation and policy made under it;
- To require records to be managed by the Commission, Parish, School or Agency which generate them in accordance with FDSC / Diocesan Council policy;
- Records not in use are disposed of in accordance with FDSC or Diocesan Council policies;
- Persons holding records must deliver them on demand to the General Manager.

These obligations and powers were contained in the Records and Archives Canon which was repealed in 2013 when Records and Archives came under the scope of the then Diocesan Services Commission (now FDSC) under the Diocesan Governance Canon. The intention at that time was for these powers and obligations in the Records and Archives Canon to be preserved in a Regulation.

The Records and Archives Committee has become a committee of the FDSC. The Diocesan Archivist and the Committee have made significant progress on a number of projects but most importantly have prepared a General Administrative Disposal and Retention Schedule after extensive consultations across the Diocese.

Regulation under the Diocesan Governance Canon

REGULATION I RECORDS AND ARCHIVES

made by the Archbishop-in-Council on 28 February 2019.

1. Under section 73 of the Canon, the Archbishop-in-Council prescribes, for the purposes of section 24(a) of the Canon that the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission is to administer the records and the Diocesan Archives in accordance with this Regulation.

Interpretation

- 2. In this Regulation, except as set out below, expressions defined in the Diocesan Governance Canon have the same meaning as set out in the Canon and:
 - "Archives" means those records which are the subject of Retention and Preservation.
 - "Disposal" (in relation to records) means the donation, transfer, sale, archiving, destruction, or otherwise deletion of records. Disposed shall have a corresponding meaning.
 - "Manage" (in relation to records and the Archives) means the acquisition, storage, provision of access to, Retention, Disposal and other management, preservation and conservation of records. Managed and Management shall have a corresponding meaning.
 - "Policies" mean policies or procedures relating to records or the Archives established by the FDSC and the Diocesan Council.
 - "Retention" (in relation to records) mean the identification of such records as are deemed essential to the corporate memory of the Church and necessary for permanent preservation in a useable form for the benefit of present and future generations.
 - "School" means an Anglican School as defined in paragraph 2(a) and (d) of the Diocesan Governance Canon.

Ownership and Management of Records

- 3. (1) The records of the Church are and shall be the property of the Corporation.
 - (2) All records of the Church must be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of this Regulation and any Policies made under this Regulation.

Delivery of records

- 4. (1) Subject to any requirements under applicable laws, all records of the Church must be Managed by the Commission, parish, School, or Agency which generates them in accordance with the Policies.
 - (2) All records of the Church which are not in regular use for entry of events or for frequent reference by those with authority to make such entries or references shall be Disposed in accordance with agreed Policies.
 - (3) A person who has the custody of or possesses any records of the Church must (on demand from the General Manager or appointed delegate) deliver them up in accordance with such demand. On delivery of such records, the person is discharged from any responsibility for those records.

46 DISABILITY ACCESS & ACTION PLAN WORKING GROUP REPORT 2019

At Synod 2018, Synod requested that Diocesan Council set up a Working Group to progress a Disability Access and Action Plan, in partnership with people with disability and their families, and in consultation with Anglicare and other expert non-governmental organisations.

Diocesan Council asked the FDSC to take carriage of this request. A working group was established over the latter part of 2018 comprising:

- Patrick Meuleman (Chair)
- Ann Edwards
- Michael Kucera
- Linda McWilliam
- Cenk Yuksel

The group has had two meetings, in January and May 2019 and has resolved to schedule monthly meetings for the remainder of 2019, utilising video conferencing for each meeting to facilitate remote attendance.

The group affirmed Synod's intention that there should be wide consultation, especially with people with disabilities, and that such consultation is critical to the success of the Action Plan. It was also noted that:

- 1. A great number of organisations have published Disability Action Plans which are freely available on the Internet. These should be reviewed and used as input into the Diocesan Action Plan.
- 2. Parishes, especially those who have parishioners with disabilities, should be invited to participate.
- 3. Input from parishioners with disabilities should be sought to determine how they would like to participate.

It is expected that development of the Plan will be undertaken in two phases as outlined below:

Phase 1

- Develop a consultative group to be involved in solutions
- Education:
 - article(s) for anglican focus
 - WHS visits
 - Property team visits
 - Parish support visits
 - Inclusion stories
- Research:
 - Existing plans
 - Case studies
- Audit of existing resources in parishes

Phase 2

- Surveying (property targeted)
- Project map
- Audit tool that can be used by anyone visiting a site (online services)
- Incorporated into education programs
- Online church services

The group has commenced working though the above and will be adapting it based on input from participants.

2020 Budget Commentary

Basis of Preparation

The 2020 budget sets out the expected income and planned expenditure for the Diocese, covering the following operational streams:

- Anglican Schools Office (Anglican Schools Commission)
- Ministry Education (Ministry Education Commission)
- Parish Services (Parishes and Other Mission Agencies Commission)
- The Episcopate and Leadership Team
- General Managers Office (including Professional Standards)
- Claim Settlements
- Finance and Diocesan Services (Finance and Diocesan Services Commission)
- The Mission Alive Fund
- Insurance Funds
- Anglican Financial Services (ANFIN)
- Special Reserves
- Going for Growth Fund
- General Trust Funds

As in previous years, the budget does not include the income or expenditure for Anglicare Southern Queensland (ASQ) other than showing the Belonging Fee and service fees received from ASQ. Similarly, the budget includes Parish Contributions and School Levies, but not the detailed income and expenses of those parishes and schools.

The budget includes activities whose net surpluses are "restricted" and cannot be used to offset other Diocesan operating costs. These include ANFIN retained profits after dividend distribution, trusts, insurance funds and parish property accounts.

2019 REFRESH BUDGET

As the 2019 Synod approved Budget was prepared six months in advance of the year of operation, the budget was revised by approval of the Diocesan Council for identified changes in revenues, costs, changed circumstances and operational initiatives.

One of the significant changes required was a result of the Diocese becoming a participant in the National Redress Scheme (NRS) that was formed following the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. It was decided to close down the existing Mutual Self Insurance Fund (MSIF), which was previously established to fund the settlement of uninsured child abuse claims. The MSIF was closed on 31 December 2018. The Diocesan Interim Redress Scheme was also closed with the majority of any new redress abuse claims expected to be processed through the NRS. A new Diocesan Redress Scheme has been established, with similar terms to the NRS to address the small number of other redress claims that are ineligible for the NRS.

The MSIF was treated as a separate restricted insurance fund. Schools made contributions to the fund and a small levy of \$80k was collected from Parishes via their ISR insurance premium. The costs of running the MSIF including claims paid, external legal costs, the claims management team and a percentage of the General Manager's Office were funded through the MSIF.

From 1 January 2019, no further MSIF contributions from schools or parish levies are being collected, we have budgeted for Schools to fully fund the cost of any abuse claims and associated external administration, legal and counselling costs, in the same manner as Anglicare does currently. In practical terms how this will operate is still open for discussion with the capacity of the business unit to pay, reputational damage and other factors needing to be considered which may result in some wider Diocesan resources being used for school claims. Claims related to Parishes continue to be covered by equity from Diocesan resources. Internal administration expenses related to claims management for all claims will be also funded by the Diocesan Operations budget.

The financial impact on the 2019 Refresh Budget from the closure of the MSIF is a reduction in income totalling \$760k being the removal of the net school contributions and parish levies.

Estimated Parish claim costs for 2019 and Diocesan internal administration costs totalling \$1,565k have been transferred from restricted funds to unrestricted funds as they now form part of the operating activities of the Diocese with no net impact on the total 2019 Budget.

Draft Budget 2020

In addition to the budget change in MSIF, there has been an allowance for increased expenditure in a number of parish growth strategies, including a targeted leadership training framework and increased curacy support. While most of these costs have been funded by additional income, the net cost increase to the 2019 Refresh Budget is \$130k.

The net result of the above changes is an increased budged deficient as shown in the Table 1

Diocesan Council endorsed the 2019 Refresh Budget with the expectation placed on the Diocesan Leadership Team to return the Diocese to surplus by 2021.

Budget 2020 Development

As noted above the Diocese is going through a period of transition with the desired outcome being long term sustainability and growth. This period of transition started in 2017 with the governance and shared services review. The following table summarises the expected pathway through this period of transition.

In order to bring the Diocese back to surplus by 2021, changes are required in 2020, it cannot all be left until 2021.

Modelling concluded that a reduction of operating expenditure in the order of 10% against 2019 budget levels are required to facilitate a return to surplus by 2021, taking into account new revenue measures. This equates to total expenditure savings of \$1.4m over the 2 years assuming no inflation or salary increases.

For the purposes of the 2020 budget model it is assumed that the cost savings of \$1.4m will be phased over two years - \$700k in 2020 and \$700k in 2021. This assumes no cost escalations, where cost escalations are proposed/required further savings are required.

The Diocesan Leadership Team were tasked with identifying the savings for 2020 whilst ensuring the Diocese continued to focus on the strategic objective of having vibrant, healthy parishes. The proposed savings were then considered by the Diocesan Leadership Team and then presented to the individual Commissions for endorsement. The required \$700k savings were identified and agreed.

2020 Budget Result

Key Assumptions

- Reduction in net operating expenditure of \$700,000
- Staff costs have been escalated by 2.2% for both Lay staff and Clergy offset by further operating expenditure savings
- Share portfolio and investment net income yield of approximately 4.6% (includes franking credits, and is net of management fees)

The 2020 Budget continues to recognise the Diocese is still in transition in relation to the costs of operation, but does make provision for investment in future sustainability and growth. As a result the 2020 unrestricted budget is a deficit of \$1.1m compared to the 2019 Refresh unrestricted budget deficit of \$2.2m.

The 2020 restricted budget is a surplus of \$472k resulting in a total 2020 Budget deficit of \$643k compared to the total 2019 Refresh Budget deficit of \$1.7m, an improvement of \$1.1m.

See Table 2 for a comparison of the 2019 Refresh Budget and the 2020 Budget.

Draft Budget 2020

Considering each item separately the following explains the major movements:

Income

Interest/Investment Income

Interest/Investment income is generated from:

- Interest earned by ANFIN on its lending portfolio
- Interest income on term deposits
- Distributions from investments in managed funds

Interest income in ANFIN is expected to increase in 2020 due to a higher level of assets under management compared to 2019. An additional tranche of funds is due to be invested in managed funds by 2020 as well as an increase in cash holdings from property sales and debt recoveries. The distribution to the Mission Alive Fund from ANFIN is budgeted to increase by \$820k from the 2019 Refresh Budget, (totalling \$5.4m).

The distribution from managed funds is assumed to be 4.6% in 2020, similar to what is expected to be achieved in 2019.

Business Operations Income

Business operations income in 2020 is budgeted to be \$442k below the 2019 Refresh Budget. Table 3 details the items included in Business Operations income.

The major reduction relates to the profit on sale of the redevelopment of the Beaconsfield Road site that is part of the South Brisbane Parish of \$702k included in the Refresh Budget 2019. No development project is currently being undertaken to replace this profit in 2020.

The increase in conference and training income is related to the Biennial School Conference and the Biennial Music Camp being held in 2020.

Commonwealth Grant Funding of Schools/School Levies

Commonwealth grants in 2020 are budgeted to increase by approximately 4.6%. Final funding will be dependent on the results of the 2019 Census.

The method by which the ASC distributes the pool of funds is by assuming each school is funded as if it is a stand-alone school not part of the system. This method provides some surplus funds to assist in funding the ASC Office. The surplus reduces each year and in 2020 is budgeted at \$919k, a reduction of 20% from 2019. Any reduction will be met by increased school levies.

Expenses

In preparation of the 2020 Budget operational cost savings have been identified, and with allowance for inflationary cost escalations, there has been a net reduction in operational expenditure by \$700k.

Employee Expenses

The increase in employee expenses is due to an assumed 2.2% increase in salaries and stipends offset by a reduction in staff within FDSC and the General Managers Office.

Business Operations Expense

Table 5 details the items included in Business Operations Expenses.

The decrease in Business Operations expense is due to:

- reduced professional services and consultants
- reduced property and grant distributions
- reduced occupancy and repair and maintenance costs
- reduced training costs and education costs (excluding the increase cost in the Biennial School Conference and the Biennial Music Camp being held in 2020)

The investment returns in the Going for Growth Fund for 2020 are budgeted at \$710k, at a similar level to 2019.


Mission Alive Fund

The activities related to Parish Services and Ministry Education, two key Diocesan Commissions with responsibility to grow and support the Church's mission activities, are funded in part through the Mission Alive Fund (Mission Alive). In addition, Mission Alive provides support to the administration (FDSC and GMO) and the Episcopate of the Diocese (E&L). Income to Mission Alive in 2020 has been increased by \$308k through an additional distribution from ANFIN (\$820k), increased investment returns (\$165k) offset by the removal of profit on property development activities (\$702k). See Table 6.

Budget 2021 Projection

The Budget deficit for 2020 is \$643k. This is an improvement from the 2019 Refresh Budget deficit of \$1,087k. This is a result of reduced operational expenditure and increased interest and investment income.

Extrapolating expected income increases for 2021 and net further operational expenditure savings, the Diocese is projected to achieve its goal of a surplus of \$172k in 2021.

Strategic Investment - Parish Growth Strategy - Resource Churches Pilot

At Diocesan Council and at the Diocesan Leadership Team there has been a focus on determining the strategic priorities of the Diocese.

The outcome has been the identification of three key focus areas:

- Renewing and reforming culture and traditions
- Parish health
- Resourcing and sustainability

Returning the Diocesan budget to surplus by 2021 clearly speaks to the third item. PMC has been focussing on the second item through the development and implementation of the Parish Growth Framework. The 2019 budget included some initial funding to further inform the approach to take to achieve this.

The PMC has now concluded that a key project for the development of heathy thriving parishes as part of implementing the Parish Growth Framework is to establish a pilot of Resource Churches within the Diocese. PMC and Diocesan Council have endorsed the project plan.

The concept of Resources Churches originated in the Church of England (CofE) where there has been growing experience over the past 20 years of developing churches that are purposed to be a resource for a city or region. While some elements of this pilot has been based on the CofE's approach to establishing Resource Churches, the overall strategy and implementation plan has been contextualised to suit the Anglican Church Southern Queensland context.

The funding proposal includes the employment of four to five ministry specialists to work with a limited number (8-10) of Resource Churches and potential Resource Churches over an initial 2 year period. The specialists will focus on building parish capacity in five key areas that are linked to church growth:

- Mission planning and implementation
- Lay ministry and leadership development
- Youth and children's ministry
- Faith formation and discipleship
- Community engagement (mission and evangelism)

The specialist roles will be more than advisory and they may work intensely with a parish for a period to develop the parish's capacity.

Background

What is a Resource Church?

A Resource Church is a particular *category* of parish who, in partnership with their regional bishop, seek to resource mission within a region. These parishes typically have an outlook 'beyond themselves', seeking (where appropriate and invited) to share programs (e.g., developed materials, systems, and processes), expertise (e.g., mentoring of other ministers), events (e.g., coordinating or hosting regional events), and facilities (e.g., training rooms). As has been a key focus in the CofE, these parishes are also selected as part of a strategy to evangelise a particular area and transform society. They are also selected for their potential to be involved in church planting (or revitalisation) and the training of missionally-minded future leaders (i.e., developing a pipeline of leaders for further planting). Resource Churches are, in effect, to act as a catalyst and enabler of growth for the region.

Function of a Resource Church

In simple terms, Resource Churches typically fulfil three core functions (two essential, one for future consideration by ACSQ). All functions are underpinned by the intention to support their regional bishop for achieving missional outcomes, especially the strengthening of other local parishes.

1. RESOURCING OTHERS

2. DEVELOPING LEADERS

3. CHURCH PLANTING (OPT)

STRONG RELATIONSHIP WITH REGIONAL BISHOP

1. Resourcing Others

- Programs: sharing materials (e.g., Sunday school curriculum, training resources, study guides), systems (e.g., pastoral care, children's check-in and tracking, church databases), and processes (e.g., newcomer integration, WH&S practices) relating to parish ministry and mission.
- **Expertise:** sharing people with specialist skills, especially in mentoring and/or training roles.
- **Events**: coordinating or hosting events of benefit to other churches in the region (e.g., training days, events in partnership with their bishop).
- **Facilities:** sharing plant and property for training, meetings, and other types of gatherings.

2. Developing Leaders

- Developing and providing leadership training initiatives (e.g., internships) and programs to accelerate
 the development of character and leadership competence and raise up leaders to help resource and
 equip the region and Diocese.
- Potential to be key placements for people in ministry training (particularly with regards to the potential for church planting).

3. Church Planting and Revitalisation

As per the approach in the CofE, the ACSQ could potentially utilise Resource Churches for the intentional planting of new worshipping communities and the revitalisation of existing parishes. Such an approach could include:

- Strategically placing (and potentially funding) appropriate curates with the view of these curates to be deployed as church planters in the future.
- Planting new worshipping communities out of the Resource Church. (Note that these worshipping communities could take a variety of shapes, as discerned as appropriate missionally for the region.)
- Revitalising existing parishes with sending teams (and intentionally trained curates).

Characteristics of a Resource Church

Resource Churches that have developed healthily tend to have the following core values:

- **Generosity**: a willingness to give away what the church has been given (resources, people, etc).
- Collegiality: a willingness to work with others to have a wider reach (deanery, other churches, diocesan bishop, diocesan teams).
- Audacity: a desire to help transform structures and communities, with a vision big enough to capture
 the imagination of an entire region or city.
- Humility: a focus of serving beyond itself (playing a part, listening and serving the region and its churches).

Other common (but not necessarily essential) characteristics include:

- Larger in size (as larger churches will generally have more capacity, including a staff team in specialist areas)
- From any tradition
- Located in a strategic place (e.g., a town centre)
- Iconic building
- High quality worship (often contemporary in nature)
- A vibrant and flourishing children's/youth ministry
- A focus on reaching new people with the Christian faith
- A commitment to developing disciples through training/small groups
- A vision to see a wide impact around their region and the practical abilities to make that happen

- Potential to multiply or send teams
- An entrepreneurial leader

Drawing from these characteristics, along with key considerations in relation to church growth, an agreed selection criteria for Resource Churches has been established and approved by the PMC.

Implementation Strategy

Given that Resource Churches form an integral part of the PMC "strategic framework to enable parish growth", it is recommended that ACSQ commits to initial funding for a pilot project over four years (set up first year (2019) + three-year pilot (2020–2022)). The proposed funding model continues until mid-2021. Funding review would be required at this point to determine continuation of funds to support the completion of the pilot.

The pilot project will entail the following steps:

- 1. **Identify** parishes that may meet the selection criteria and also publically invite any parish to submit expressions of interest in becoming a Resource Church.
- 2. **Assess** identified parishes (and those who have expressed interest), and assess if they meet the criteria or have the potential to meet the criteria with assistance.
- 3. **Invite** capable parishes (those that currently meet the criteria) and those who have the potential with support to meet the criteria (up to ten) to participate in a three-year pilot program as a Resource Church.
- 4. **Support** the Resource Churches through:
 - a. the establishment of a Resource Church Learning Group.
 - b. a suitable coach for the leader of each Resource Church.
 - c. the employment of 4–5 specialists with skills in the following areas key to church growth:
 - 1. Mission planning and implementation
 - 2. Lay ministry and leadership development
 - 3. Youth and children's ministry
 - 4. Faith formation and discipleship
 - 5. Community engagement (mission and evangelism)
 - *(plus any other areas as identified and required e.g. liturgy, communication, administration, processes)

Each specialist will work across all the Resource Churches in his or her particular area of expertise. The specialist's role would be more than advisory and they may work intensely in a potential Resource Church for a period to develop its capacity.

- 5. **Review** the Resource Churches on an annual basis in relation to functions and growth, with pilot project review at the end of 2023. Review the funding for support in June 2021 with a view to continuing the funding if the project is showing signs of effectiveness.
- 6. **Ascertain** (optional) if there is opportunity for any of the Resource Churches to be involved in church planting and/or other forms of revitalisation.

Financial Impact

The impact on the 2020 Budget is a net cost in of \$590k including allowance for administration and employment of specialists. This has been included in the 2020 budget. The financial impact of this pilot on the 2020 budget is outlined in Table 8.

Conclusion

The 2020 budget recognises the current period of transition and the need to invest in capability to address concerns and facilitate growth. Prior to the incorporation of the Resource Churches Pilot, current projections for 2021 show a surplus budget position can be achieved through further operational cost reductions. Inclusion of the Resources Churches Pilot into 2021 projections will result in a deficit in 2021, deferring the move to a surplus until 2022 unless further savings can be found.

Diocesan Council recommends the adoption of this budget incorporating the Resource Churches Pilot as detailed in Attachment 1 acknowledging that deficit budgets are not sustainable in the medium to long term.

Resolution

That Synod approves the Budget for the year ending 31 December 2020 as detailed in the attached summary and in so doing notes:

- this Budget has been prepared eight months in advance of the year of operation.
- that the Budget will need revision and approval by Diocesan Council in the light of any unforeseen external economic factors, and more up-to-date estimates of revenue and costs which may emerge in the intervening period.
- that, whilst Synod acknowledges that the budget may require a refresh in light of changed circumstances, the intent of operational initiatives included in the budget as submitted be honoured where possible.

HANDBOOK FOR SYNOD

Handbook for Synod

This handbook is intended to assist members of Synod, particularly those attending for the first time, to follow proceedings. It has been revised from time to time, but any member of Synod who has any comments or suggestions should convey these to the General Manager in writing so that further revision might take account of these views.

A Touch of History

The Synod of the Diocese of Brisbane is our church parliament, where church laws may be passed, and the health and work of this part of the Anglican Church of Australia reviewed and strengthened.

The first Synod in Brisbane met in 1868 under Bishop Tufnell. The other Synods of the Australian church were being set up about then, and they all were modelled to some degree upon the English parliamentary system, where there were three tiers of government:

the Queen, the House of Lords, the House of Commons.

Our Synod continues that three-tiered arrangement, although we all sit and debate together, not in separate places. We are called three "houses":

the Archbishop, the clergy, the representatives of the laity.

We usually vote together, but there is provision for each house to vote separately if a matter is very contentious, and then there has to be a majority in each house. Note that the Archbishop forms a house alone, and takes a full part in the debates and decision making (that is, the Archbishop is not a figure-head or a mere symbol, like the Queen in our present parliamentary system). The Assistant Bishops vote in the house of clergy.

In this Diocese, we understand that the clergy or lay representatives do not come to Synod merely as delegates of their particular parish, but they try to represent the people of the whole Church. Naturally, there will be times when they will be asked to raise a matter, or put a point of view, on behalf of the "people back home", but that is only part of their job. It is also part of their job to represent the rest of the Church to the people of their home parish, when they return from Synod.

Taking a Vote

The ways in which votes may be taken are set out in Figure 1 [Figures appear at the end of this Handbook]. Rarely do we get past the voices or show of hands.

Diocesan Council may approve a method of electronic voting. If electronic voting is used, the method will be explained to members at Synod.

Standing Orders

The Standing Orders are the rules that Synod makes to regulate its own business. A copy of the Standing Orders is printed as Appendix 1 to the *Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Brisbane*, and should be kept up to date whenever changes are made by Synod. In this Handbook, we occasionally refer to the Standing Orders, so that you can read the actual wording if you wish – e.g. SO/E.2 would mean "refer to Standing Order E.2".

The Standing Orders may be suspended for any particular instance by motion, and notice of this should be given in the usual way (SO/C.12). However, where a member considers that there is a case of urgency, ten members of Synod are required to support the mover, and if Synod agrees that there is an urgent case, then suspension of Standing Orders can be moved without notice.

It is clear that Synod is basically in charge of its own business and has very wide powers to act for the good of the Diocese.

Seating

The Archbishop sits at the main table, with the General Manager on the right and the Chairman of Committees on the left. To the far right of this table sit the two Secretaries of Synod, one clerical and one lay. To the far left of this table sits the Archbishop's Chaplain and behind the table is the timekeeper.

The table on the main floor of Synod is used by the Chancellor, the Assistant Bishops and by members of Synod involved in presenting business.

The other members of Synod, both laity and clergy, sit in the main hall area designated for them, and must not try to speak or vote from outside of that area.

Speaking from the members' seats is usually ineffective, and it is essential in practice for members to use one of the microphones. Members are advised to place themselves near a microphone before they are called on to speak, so as to save Synod's time.

Each day of Synod, all members indicate their attendance by signing a card and placing it in the designated box at the main entrance. The boxes are cleared each day, late in the day's sitting, by the Secretaries – these cards are the record of who was present that day in Synod. The Diocesan Council may approve an alternative method for recording attendance.

Presiding Officer

The Archbishop is the President of Synod, and is usually addressed as "Mr President" or "Your Grace".

Members of Synod always address the presiding officer, never another member, and must stand to do so.

Starting a Debate

1. Debates on motions

You can start a debate in Synod by moving a motion. The passage of a motion is outlined in Figure 2 [Figures appear at the end of this Handbook].

There are three ways in which a motion can be placed on the business paper -

- (a) **1st way** by giving written notice of motion, signed by the mover, to the General Manager at least five weeks before the first day of the session.
- (b) **2nd way** by giving written notice of motion, signed by the mover, to the General Manager at any time from the five weeks before the start of Synod up to the end of the second day of sitting. These notices of motion are dealt with by the Order of Business Committee [as set out later in these notes].
- (c) **3rd way** by standing in Synod when the item "Notices of Questions and Motions" is called, and moving: "That Synod give leave for a notice of motion *[dealing with ...]* to be given." The Synod will probably want to hear the text of the motion, or at least the subject matter, and may want to hear some justification for its being brought up at this stage. There is no guarantee that the Synod will agree to the inclusion of the motion on the notice paper.

2. Late motions

Under the **2nd way** [see above] the role of the Order of Business Committee is to decide whether, in their opinion, the motion should go on a supplementary business paper. The criteria they are to use are set out in SO/C.6 – either under sub-section (5), where all of the criteria in (a), (b) and (c) have to be satisfied, or under sub-section (6). If the Committee agrees that the motion ought to be considered at this Synod, they issue a Certificate of Inclusion, and the motion goes on a supplementary business paper.

On the 1st, 2nd and 3rd days of sitting, the supplementary business paper will be called over by the President. Anyone can object to including the motion which is on the supplementary business paper in the actual business paper, and the person objecting has to move: "That the motion be **not** included in the business paper." The motion must be seconded, and may be debated before the Synod decides. If no-one objects, or if the Synod does not uphold the objection, each notice of motion goes across to the actual business paper of Synod.

The business paper, now including the motions accepted from the supplementary paper, together with any motions which on a previous day have been included by leave of Synod, is called over by the President as described in section 4 "Callover of the business paper".

3. Motions involving expenditure

Notices of motion that will, if passed, result in expenditure affecting the budget for the current year, or the budget for the next calendar year, cannot be included in the business papers unless certain information is also provided. This is set out in SO/C.7A(1).

The method by which Synod handles such motions is set out in detail in SO/C.7A(2)-(5). The first question that the President puts to the Synod is "That the Synod agree to the general principles of the motion". Here, the policy involved in the proposal is debated, and agreed to or not.

If the general principles of the motion are agreed to, and if the Chair of the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission is of the opinion that any net increase in expenditure in one financial year will not exceed \$10,000, the President puts to the Synod the question "That the motion be agreed to". If this is carried, the relevant budget [either for the current year or for the following year] is deemed to have been amended accordingly.

If the general principles of the motion are agreed to, and if the Chair of the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission is of the opinion that any net increase in expenditure will be more than \$10,000 a year, the mover of the motion [or someone else with leave of Synod] can move for the relevant budget [or draft budget] to be altered to incorporate the proposed expenditure. Synod then has to debate, and vote on, this question.

If the general principles of the motion are agreed to, but no alteration has been made to a budget or draft budget, the matter is automatically referred to the Diocesan Council for consideration.

4. Callover of the business paper

Early on each day of sitting (after the first day) or at any other time the President considers it would be helpful, the President calls over the list of motions on the business paper, including any that have just been brought in from the supplementary business paper, and any that have been included on the business paper by leave of Synod. The object of this Callover is to identify and deal with "formal" motions (SO/C8). This is a way of saving the time of Synod.

Any member who wishes later to debate the motion being called, or propose an amendment to it, should call out "Object!" when the President calls out its number – otherwise the motion will be treated as formal. If the President does not hear anyone call "Object!", the President may call the number again, and perhaps read the first few words of the motion, or indicate the subject matter, so that members have full opportunity of objecting to the treatment of the motion in this formal way. If no one objects to the motion being treated as a formal motion, the President will invite the mover to move the motion formally, and speak for no more than two minutes. No amendment or further debate is allowed. A vote on the motion is then taken.

The only person who cannot object to the Synod's dealing with a motion formally is the mover.

5. Order of business

Motions are usually listed on the business paper in the order in which they have been received. The Order of Business Committee may however alter this order for the more efficient working of Synod. Synod may, for example, order certain motions to be debated together, or set a motion down for debate at a fixed time (called an "Order of the Day").

6. Speaking to a motion

If the motion is to be debated, i.e. not taken formally, then the mover usually speaks first for up to ten minutes.

The seconder may be called on to speak next, but if they decline, there is no guarantee they will have an opportunity to speak later in the debate.

With the leave of Synod, a member may move (as set out in SO/C.7 (2)) that someone who is not a member of Synod have a seat on the floor and address Synod either:

- a) if the mover consents, in lieu of the mover speaking; or
- b) during the debate on the motion.

7. Handouts & presentations

With the leave of Synod, a member may move that specified information or other material relating to a motion may be distributed to Synod members (including electronically). The President must be of the opinion that it is proper to do so.

If a mover wishes to use any form of digital or electronic visual, or sound display, or presentation in presenting their motion, the mover must submit an electronic version for approval by the President. A written request must be sent to the General Manager at least four business days before Synod. This is set out in SO/D.18. The time limits for movers of motions still apply.

8. Amendments & procedural motions

During debate on a motion, a member may move to amend the motion. An amendment requires a mover and a seconder and is debated separately from the principal motion. An amendment is in that sense a "debate within a debate" and may be stopped in the same way as any other debate (see below).

The debate on the principal motion cannot continue until after the amendment has been dealt with.

Amendments to a motion, and procedural motions, do not require notice. Amendments should be in writing in order to ease the work of the President and the Secretaries.

9. Assent of the Archbishop

All resolutions of the Synod, including resolutions for the passing of a Canon, require the assent of the Archbishop. The Archbishop's assent is usually assumed, but it is possible for the Archbishop to withhold assent on any resolution.

Stopping a Debate

There are the following ways of stopping a debate –

- a) By no one else getting up to speak. The mover of the original motion then has the right of reply (SO/D.4, D.13) and then the vote is taken.
- b) By moving "that the question be now put" (sometimes called "the gag"). If this is <u>carried</u>, the debate is ended at once; the mover of the original motion has no right of reply; and the vote is taken at once. If the gag is not carried, the debate continues.
- c) By moving "that the question be not now put" (sometimes called "the previous question" SO/D.8). It requires a seconder, and can only be moved upon a motion, not while an amendment is being discussed. It cannot be moved in Committee. The previous question itself may then be debated, and the main motion, a vote on which it is desired to forestall, may be debated. If the previous question is <u>carried</u>, the original motion is dropped, and no decision is taken upon it at all and Synod goes on to its next business. If the previous question is <u>not carried</u>, the original motion is put to a vote at once, except that the mover has right of reply.
- d) By moving "that the Synod (or Committee) proceed to the next business". This motion requires a seconder, but can be moved and seconded only by persons who have not previously spoken to the motion. It is put to the vote at once, without any amendment or debate. If it is <u>carried</u>, the original motion is dropped, and no decision is taken upon it at all – and the Synod goes on to its next business. If it is <u>not carried</u>, the discussion on the original motion continues.

The President has a discretion as to whether to allow the gag, the previous question, or the next business to be moved.

In Committee

Synod sometimes goes into "Committee of the whole Synod". This is usually for detailed debate on the wording of a Canon, or of a very lengthy or complicated motion, or for detailed consideration of a report.

In Committee, the presiding officer is the Chairman of Committees, not the Archbishop (SO/D.14), and is usually addressed as "Mr Chairman". When the Committee's work is done, the Chairman formally reports this to the President of Synod.

The advantages of working in Committee are -

- a) it is no great bother to go back over an earlier part of the business that is before the Committee;
- b) motions do not require a seconder (SO/D.1);
- c) the restriction that you may normally speak only once to a motion in Synod (SO/D.13) does not apply – you may speak no more than three times on a motion in Committee (SO/D.15);
- d) you do not need to give notice of a motion.

Canons

Canons come in two kinds – (a) people, and (b) church laws.

"People" Canons

These canons are members of the clergy chosen by the Archbishop, and come in three groups – residentiary, honorary and minor. The residentiary Canons are members of the Cathedral Chapter, which has the task of running the Cathedral. The lay members of the Cathedral Chapter are known as Lay Canons.

"Law" Canons

When it is proposed to pass a canon, you find that they are given a greater "going-over" by Synod than a simple motion is, and they go through various stages before they are passed. Once they are passed, however, it takes just as much trouble (in fact the same procedure exactly) to alter or remove them. The passage of a Canon is outlined in Figure 3 [Figures appear at the end of this Handbook].

Notice of a proposed Canon has to be given to members at least 21 days before the meeting of Synod. Most canons are presented at the request of the Diocesan Council. However, any member of Synod is at liberty to propose a Canon – see SO/G.2 for the procedure.

The FIRST step for a Canon is for Synod to agree to the motion "that the Synod agree to the general principles" of the proposed Canon. This is where the proposed Canon is debated in principle, and often at great length. The proposed Canon could be thrown out at this stage if its main proposals are not agreeable to Synod (SO/G.5).

Early in the first step, **QUESTIONS** can be directed by members of Synod to the mover and seconder – once the mover has spoken, and the motion has been seconded (SO/G.6).

The SECOND step for a canon is for it to be considered in Committee of the whole Synod. Here it is considered section by section if necessary, and any part of it may be altered, tidied up, or deleted. When it has been fully worked over, the Chairman of Committees, who presides over this part of the business, reports to the President that the Committee has done its work: the Synod then accepts this work (or not) by agreeing that the Chairman's report be adopted (SO/G.8).

The second step is omitted if no one indicates an intention to propose an amendment to the wording of the Canon (SO/G.7).

The THIRD step for a canon is the passing of the canon, which gives Synod a final chance to consider the proposed canon (SO/G.9). It would be unusual for Synod to debate this step.

The FOURTH step for a Canon is for the Archbishop to signify assent to, or dissent from, the proposed canon (SO/G.11).

The church laws called Canons are binding upon all the church people of the Diocese; they are acknowledged as binding by anyone who takes an official position with the Diocese (e.g.

the clergy, churchwardens, members of Synod and certain other officials) by signing the "Declaration of Submission to Synod".

Reports

One of the jobs of Synod is to review the working of the Diocese over the past year, and so various reports are presented. This principle of the accountability of councils, commissions, boards and committees to Synod is considered to be important, which is why the consideration of the major reports has a priority in the arrangement of the business.

The major reports are dealt with in Committee of the whole Synod. Any member of Synod is at liberty to ask questions about these reports as they are being discussed, and to comment as may be thought fit.

The same principles apply to the financial reports (including the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission Report) and the Diocesan accounts.

Specially appointed select committees may produce reports with recommendations which the committee wants Synod to adopt. Synod cannot amend the reports presented to it – the report is the "property" of the body producing it.

The usual options open to Synod in dealing with a report are -

- a) to receive the report;
- b) to refuse to receive the report;
- c) to endorse the report;
- d) to ask the body or some other body to do further work.

When Synod starts working on a recommendation in such a report, however, it has the freedom to shape the recommendation into a motion that expresses the agreed mind of Synod. This recommendation, with whatever amendments are made by Synod, then expresses the policy of the Synod.

Budget

Each year the Synod is asked, by way of a motion, to approve the Diocesan budget and the schedule of agreed parish contributions for the following *calendar* year.

The budget papers are provided to members before the commencement of the Synod and are the result of careful consideration and painstaking work on the part of the Executive Director of the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission and the General Manager and their staff.

However, it is open to any member to move an amendment to the budget or the schedule of contributions. The budget is usually considered line by line in Committee. This is the appropriate time to move an amendment to the budget, unless the matter is or has been the subject of a notice of motion (see above under "Starting a Debate", sec. 3 "Motions involving expenditure"). Before doing so, members should consider the following —

 The Executive Director of the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission and General Manager put much work into the preparation of the budget. It is only common courtesy to give them adequate notice before Synod commences of any concerns you have or amendments you would like to make.

- Your amendments should be written down and given to either the Chairman of Committees or one of the Secretaries before the budget debate begins. In this way the Chairman can help the Synod deal with the amendments quickly and efficiently.
- If you want to amend the budget to increase expenditure items, also outline consequential amendments to the income items to fund these increases in spending. If you do not, any of the following consequences may occur
 - a) the lack of funding for the increase in spending will be a strong argument against your amendment;
 - b) the parish contributions may need to be uniformly increased to cover the extra funds required; or
 - c) the amendment may be of such a nature that, without a suggestion on funding, it cannot be efficiently dealt with by the Synod and therefore be ruled out of order.

It is always a good idea to consult the Executive Director of the Finance & Diocesan Services Commission first if you have any concerns about the budget.

Elections

At the first annual session of each three-year Synod, the Synod has the duty of electing people to a number of positions, such as Diocesan Council, Archbishop Election Committee, etc. The people elected serve for a three-year term. The exception to this are the elections for representatives in General Synod. These representatives are usually elected in the year prior to a session of those bodies.

Nominations for the elections are given in writing to the Secretaries on the first day, and on the second day of sitting up to 4pm [unless the Synod sets a different closing time]. The nomination form must be signed by the two nominators and by the person being nominated or otherwise be submitted electronically by any approved method.

In some ballots, the clergy only vote for the clergy, and the laity only for the laity – but in most ballots, we all have the right to vote for both clergy and laity. Whatever groups appear in your ballot material, they are the ones you can vote for.

In an election where the clergy only vote for the clergy, and the laity only for the laity, the nominators must be members of the appropriate house of Synod.

On the third day of Synod, at the times set down in SO/F.8 (and repeated in the Program and Order of Business), the ballot will open. Voting papers are obtainable at the entrance to the Synod hall by each member of Synod, or, if electronic voting is used, the method of voting will become available. If you spoil a voting paper, you can always obtain a fresh one. An electronic vote, once submitted, is final.

You vote for a candidate by placing a cross in the box beside the candidate's name on a voting paper or otherwise in accordance with any electronic method being used. You can vote for any number of candidates in a ballot, up to the number of persons who have to be elected

- this number is shown on the ballot material. If you vote for more candidates than you are entitled to, your vote will be informal, and will not be counted.

Results are usually announced on the last day of sitting. Full details on elections are found in SO/F.

Questions

A member of Synod may give notice of a question to the President, usually to clarify a matter, or to gain information about some aspect of the Diocese. SO/C.13 should be studied carefully to see what matters may be the subject of questions, and how questions are to be framed. By giving notice of the question, you give the President time to research the answer, or have someone on the Diocesan staff work on it.

The Order of Business provides an opportunity on all but the final day of the session for notice of a question to be given. The question is read aloud to the Synod, and a copy is then provided to one of the Secretaries.

At a later time in the session, the President will read the question again to the Synod, and then read the answer. Both question and answer are recorded in the minutes, and printed in the abridged proceedings of Synod in the Year Book.

Behaviour in Synod

Every member of Synod is expected to observe certain standards of behaviour to promote the efficient running of Synod. In summary, members are expected –

- a) not to interrupt a speaker other than through the President;
- b) to be silent while another member is speaking;
- c) to speak only on the subject matter of the debate before Synod at the time;
- d) to address all comments, questions etc. to the President (or the Chairman if in Committee) and not directly to other members; and
- e) to avoid making personal reflections on another member or imputing improper motives.

Members must resume their seats and be silent if the President or Chairman of Committees is speaking.

Members are expected to attend each session of Synod. It may be necessary for members to enter or leave the floor while Synod is in session. If this is the case, a member should silently acknowledge the President or Chairman (customarily by a small bow of the head) and leave or enter so as to cause as little disruption or distraction as possible. Members should not pass between the Chair and the member who is speaking.

Members should also be conscious that noise in the precincts of the Synod venue may disrupt or distract Synod while in session. Therefore, members are requested to keep such noise to a minimum.

With increased use of digital devices by members to interact with Synod business, members are expected to not allow these devices to be a distraction to others. This includes:

- a) making sure your device is on mute or silent;
- b) not using your device for non-Synod business or entertainment (including not using headphones);
- c) limiting your use of the venue's WiFi capability to Synod related business.

The Chancellor

The Chancellor is the Archbishop's adviser on Church law.

During a session of Synod, the Chancellor is available to any member to assist in understanding a proposal that may be coming before Synod, and to assist with the wording of any motion or amendment that a member may be contemplating. The Chancellor will explain any point of Synod procedure to a member, and advise on the best way for a member to achieve the member's objectives within the limitations of normal Synod practice.

The Archbishop has appointed a Deputy Chancellor, who is similarly available during a session of Synod.

The Timekeeper

A timekeeper is appointed (usually with a deputy), to ring a bell when a speaker has got to the end of the allotted time for a speech.

The schedule of how much time is given to speakers is to be found in SO/D.10. Extensions of time are provided for.

The Public

The public, especially church people who are not members of Synod, are welcome to attend and observe the proceedings. They sit in the area designated for visitors, not in the main hall area allocated to members of Synod.

Representatives of the news media are invited to attend, and may report the debates and decisions of Synod.

On very rare occasions, Synod has decided by motion to exclude the press and the public, and for a particular debate to sit in secret ("in camera") – but these occasions are certainly not common.



Passing a Motion



Passing a Canon





